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India – Government Starts Issuing OCI Cards to Replace PIO Cards

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India's government has merged the Person of Indian ('PIO') card and Overseas Citizen of India ('OCI') card programs by means of the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2015.¹

Why This Matters

Immigration professionals and global mobility managers with immigration responsibilities vis-à-vis their globally mobile employees should be aware of these changes, as should individuals who are currently registered under the PIO scheme. In due course, PIO cards will no longer be recognized as valid. Further, going forward, eligible applicants can only apply for an OCI card, as the PIO card scheme has been withdrawn.

Under the new regime,² PIO card holders are deemed to be OCI card holders and are entitled to benefits such as life-long visas and exemption from police registration.

The government has now mandated³ all PIO cardholders to apply for OCI cards in lieu of their existing PIO cards.

- The application for an OCI card in lieu of a PIO card needs to be submitted with the Indian Embassy / Foreigners' Regional Registration Office ("FRRO"), which originally issued the PIO card to the applicant.
- The OCI card in lieu of the PIO card would be granted if the PIO card was valid on 9 January 2015.
- The OCI card will be issued free of cost to all existing PIO cardholders.
