## Healthcare regulatory news

HHS [proposed withdrawing](#) a Trump Administration rule requiring review of all department regulations every 10 years.

CMS [opened healthcare.gov for "window shopping"](#) ahead of November 1st open enrollment... CMS will [cut payments to 47%](#)

[\(2,499\) of hospitals](#), through the Hospital Readmissions Reduction Program.

HHS announced a [federal overdose prevention strategy](#).

FDA and Canadian/UK regulators [issued guiding principles for AI and machine-learning-enabled](#) medical devices... FDA, NIH, 10 pharmaceutical companies, and five nonprofits [launched a \\$76M five-year consortium](#) to accelerate rare disease gene therapy development.

A Justice Department (DOJ) official said the [Administration is likely to increase enforcement of white collar crimes](#).



### Healthcare law and policy news

President Biden announced [a framework for Congressional Democrats' scaled-back reconciliation](#) package, including temporary extension of enhanced ACA subsidies, ACA tax credits for those in the Medicaid "coverage gap," a new Medicare hearing benefit, \$150B for home and community-based services, and repeal of the Trump Administration drug rebate rule... Notably, the [framework does not include any prescription drug pricing](#) provisions.

Boehringer Ingelheim [sued HHS alleging that HRSA's interpretation of the 340B program](#) has expanded the program [inconsistent with statutory text](#) to include for-profit pharmacies... DOJ alleges that [Kaiser Permanente defrauded Medicare out of \\$1B](#) through diagnosis coding... Johnson & Johnson [will pay \\$297M to resolve opioid epidemic-related claims](#) in Texas... UnitedHealthcare is suing TeamHealth, [alleging that it fraudulently billed](#) for services inconsistent with actual care provided.

23andMe plans to [acquire Lemonaid Health](#) (\$400M)... Bristol Myers Squibb is reportedly [interested in acquiring Aurinia Pharmaceuticals](#)... Novartis is [considering the sale/spinoff of Sandoz, its generic drug business](#)... Takeda [will acquire GammaDelta](#)... Mark Cuban and the Purchaser Business Group [each launched new PBMs](#)... Centene is [evaluating proposals for a PBM](#) to manage its \$30B annual drug spending... FTC will [require DaVita](#) to divest three dialysis clinics, avoid no-poach agreements, and [limit future acquisitions](#) in Utah.

Cigna will [expand access to virtual-first primary, dermatology, behavioral, and urgent care](#) services for select employers... Aetna announced [a network focused on coverage of expensive gene therapies](#)... Premier and Resilinc [expanded their collaboration](#) to mitigate supply chain disruptions.

Modern Healthcare reported that [hospitals continue to charge vastly different prices for the same procedure](#) even with new price transparency requirements.

# COVID-19 News Supplement

## COVID-19 by the Numbers

There have now been [roughly 45.8 million confirmed COVID-19 cases](#) in the US, with a death toll over 740,000... The country is [averaging roughly 70,000 new cases per day](#) over the past week, down 20% over the past two weeks; deaths per day are down 15% to roughly 1,400... According to [HHS data](#), [daily pediatric hospital admissions with confirmed COVID-19 have fallen 56%](#) since the end of August.

416 million COVID-19 [vaccine doses have been administered](#) in the US (roughly 756,000/day over the past week)... More than 221 million Americans ([78% of Americans 12 and older](#)) have received at least one COVID-19 vaccine dose; over 191 million Americans are fully vaccinated (67.4% of Americans 12 and older); 15.4 million Americans have received a booster dose.

## Executive and Administrative Action

The Biden Administration will [ease air travel restrictions for fully vaccinated foreign nationals](#) as of November 8 and said that it would not dictate a standard for airlines to verify vaccination status.

The federal government purchased an [additional 50 million pediatric doses](#) of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine, set to be delivered by the end of April.

CMS [guidance clarifies](#) that state [Medicaid program and the Children's Health Insurance Program \(CHIP\) are required to cover treatments](#) for COVID-19, including preventive therapies and treatment for "long COVID," without cost-sharing.

HHS [announced actions to increase access to over-the-counter](#) (OTC) COVID-19 tests, including FDA permitting developers of COVID-19 serial tests to apply for their product to be authorized as single-use OTC tests without submitting additional data, FDA authorization of an additional OTC rapid antigen test, and an NIH investment of \$70 million to expedite high-quality at-home tests to the market in coordination with FDA.

FDA and Aetion will [collect real-world evidence \(RWE\) on inpatient COVID-19 therapies](#) and attempt to prove how a platform-based approach can help accelerate regulatory knowledge on the use of RWE and be applied to consideration of therapies for future pandemics.

EEOC guidance stated that workplace anti-bias laws requiring exemptions from COVID-19 vaccine requirements [do not extend to non-religious concerns, such as political, social, or personal objections](#).

GAO issued its [eighth report on the federal government's response to the pandemic](#), which included new recommendations in several areas, including provider aid oversight, unemployment insurance fraud, worker safety, and COVID-19 testing.

## Healthcare Law, Business, and Policy News

A [JAMA study found](#) that hospitals that received the most federal COVID-19 relief funds were disproportionately academic-affiliated and had higher pre-pandemic assets; however, those hospitals were also more likely to have higher COVID-19 case numbers... An Urban Institute analysis estimated that [there is \\$26.8B left in COVID-19 relief funds](#).

CDC reported that [17.1 million children globally did not receive](#) their first diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (DTP) doses in 2020 due to the pandemic.

An [Axios-Ipsos survey](#) found that just 44% of Americans are confident the Biden Administration can ensure the economy recovers quickly after the COVID-19 pandemic, an eight percentage point drop since late January... A KFF poll found that [27% of parents would seek out vaccinations](#) for their children ages 5 to 11 immediately after authorized.

## Surveillance, Testing, and Treatment

FDA's Vaccines and Related Biological Products Advisory Committee [voted \(17-0 with one abstention\) in favor of authorizing](#) Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine for children ages 5 to 11, although some committee members expressed concerns about the lack of sufficient data and the possibility of vaccine mandates in schools... FDA [documents posted in advance](#) of the Committee's meeting concluded that the benefits of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine far outweigh the potential risks, including myocarditis, for children ages 5 to 11... FDA is expected to grant emergency use authorization for use of the vaccine in that age group, with [shipments beginning as early as this weekend](#)... Pfizer also reported that the [vaccine is 90.7% effective in children ages 5 to 11](#).

Moderna reported that its COVID-19 [vaccine induced a strong antibody response](#) in children ages 6 to 11.

White House Chief Medical Advisor Anthony Fauci said that millions of children under the age of 12 [could begin getting COVID-19 vaccines "within the first week or two of November"](#).

BioNTech plans to expand COVID-19 vaccine production and share know-how with local companies in Africa, while Moderna agreed to boost vaccine donations to Africa; some [critics expressed the need for additional support](#) to ensure appropriate access to African countries.

CDC [updated guidelines to say that adults who are "moderately to severely immunocompromised"](#) and have received three doses of an mRNA vaccine may get a fourth shot (Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna, or Johnson & Johnson) at least six months after getting their third mRNA dose.

Merck granted a [royalty-free license for its COVID-19 antiviral pill to the Medicines Patent Pool](#), a UN-backed nonprofit, to allow companies to manufacture and cheaply sell the product in 105 lower- and middle-income, primarily African and Asian, countries... Merck said that it is ready to [produce and distribute ten million doses of the antiviral pills](#) to higher-income countries by the end of this year and more than double that next year, assuming the drug is authorized by the FDA.

Brazilian researchers reported that the antidepressant fluvoxamine [reduced the risk of hospitalization for COVID-19 patients](#) by 32%.
